~ Cannon Street Road Conundrum ~

The physical address of Louisa Ker and family in Cannon St Rd, has always thought to be near the church of St George in the East. Some further digging has uncovered some puzzling conflicts and address anomalies.

Firstly, let's look at a list of the addresses which have been noted from various documents. They've been transcribed as found –



1837 – Rent books – Cannon St (all the neighbour names remain the same from 1810 -1837)

Secondly, Cannon St Rd still exists and is also known as B108. Let's start from the south end where the church 'St George in the East' is located. That road is now called The Highway (A1203), but in the early 1800's, the small section that intersected was known as Ratcliff Highway. It then travels north, crosses over Commercial Road, and finishes at Whitechapel Road. The section between Commercial Road and Whitechapel Road was also known as New Road. See map next page.

Thirdly, Cannon St Rd was also known as just Cannon St. Somewhere in time "Road" was added to its name. London had many street-name duplicates, and in order to differentiate them, the name of a main street it connected to, was tagged on the end as an 'identifier'.

This is how it looks today -



This practice of tagging the main road onto one's address resulted in addresses such as

1 Cannon St, Ratcliff, or 2 Cannon St, Ratcliff Highway (as mentioned above). This extra 'identifier' started before numbers were even given to properties. In this case, it tells the postman etc. it's **this** Cannon St, not the one in Southwark.

Many streets were renamed over time, many were also renumbered. Some Streets weren't numbered odds on one side with evens on the other. If three units were demolished and a large building took its place, some numbers would just disappear completely.

Fourthly, the north end of Cannon St Rd (also called New Road) on the west side – gained the name Gloucester Terrace. This presents in the 1832 and 1833 insurance records for Louisa.

It was found in a map dated 1826 as Gloster Terrace.

Mr Lockie wrote in 1810 -

"Gloucester Terrace, Cannon Street Road, forms part of the West side, it extends from the Commercial Road to Charlotte St, Whitechapel."

These are the second and third blocks down from Whitechapel Road.

Charlotte St is now called Fieldgate St. Quite a lot of the street names from that map have since changed.

The name Gloucester was picked up again in Charles Booth's poverty maps of 1898 as Gloucester Place - https://booth.lse.ac.uk/map/16/-0.0639/51.5157/100/0






The legend shows these houses as "Fairly comfortable. Good ordinary Earnings". It's the same colour for dwellings opposite St George in the East.

Here are a couple of links to a property one block south of number 10. It's been restored to it's former glory of the 1800's. Amazing!

Fifthly, Booth's map also shows that Cannon St Rd/New Street is in six different parishes!



St George – in the East

St John the Evangelist – Commercial Road

Christ Church – Watney Street

St Augustine – Stepney

St Philip – Stepney


St Mary – Whitechapel

Saying you lived in Cannon St Rd may have been enough to get your family's religious needs met at St George in the East, regardless of which end one lived at.

Number 10 Gloucester Terrace is marked by the green square.




It looks like this today (under the blue arrow) -



It's hard to know whether it had a shop below in the early 1800's.

Sixthly, and interestingly, this extra delving into the address actually came about from Louisa's death duty document dated 1837 –




She died intestate. The Administratrix was her daughter Louisa (Peterson) Shephard.

The address – 15 Oxford St, Cannon St Rd.

Initially taken as Oxford St in Soho, with some additional information of Louisa's address.


Further investigation found that Cannon St Rd was the main St 'identifier' and Oxford St (also known as New Oxford St) was located here on a map from 1830.



Daughter Louisa was yet again living very close to the home she grew up in. She was also the only remaining child of Louisa's still living in the UK.

15 Oxford St has been difficult to pin down. Note that the Royal London Hospital is now located on both sides of the street – now called Stepney Way.

Seventhly, the names of the neighbours in the rent books have stayed the same from Peter Peterson in 1809 –



While Louisa was now a widow, the rent book name has remained as John Uhr.

The property was still subsidised by the Trustees of Wapping, and the neighbours were still Outhwaite, John Kent, and Abraham Crofft. Bizarrely the rent had actually gone down for all of them.



Even stranger are the listings in the pages which are in the years to follow...mentioned in the article *The Mystery Mariner*. This from **1847** (10 years after Louisa had passed), looks very much like Daniel Uhr or Usher.

Does this mean the rent books couldn't be trusted for accuracy?


Was Louisa and family actually at the south end of Cannon St Rd?

Did she move from one end to the other, and the rent books are seriously that wrong?

Did the address Cannon St Rd, Ratcliff Highway signify they were opposite St George in the East? Or was this simply the name of the main street 'identifier' at the time?

Why was it # 1 or #2 Cannon St Rd?


1830 Map -



Did Sun Fire Insurance make an error in the address of 10 Gloucester Terrace?

These are puzzling questions, but none more than puzzling than the numerous people insured by Sun Fire Insurance at Gloucester Terrace. The dates which start in 1803. Therefore, why was it not always referred to as Gloucester Terrace for this family?

Maybe the Interactive London Map located in 'Resources' located on this website, should have the premises back down the south end, not as shown here?



One thing's for sure, Daughter Louisa had stayed close to home before her mother passed.

Regardless of just how close her daughter lived, it should also be noted that from page 8 in the Petersons and Uhrs Book, it was believed they lived on the east side of the street.

the PETERSON home, rented from the Trustees of the Wapping Charity Schools, was a few doors south of the church entrance and backed onto the extensive churchyard. St George's was a large and

Eighthly, if Louisa was in fact ever at the north end in Gloucester Terrace, then possibly she had boarders.



Leopold Amelang was registered to vote at that address in 1833 and 1835. Sun Fire Insurance also has him there in 1831 and 1834. He was also at that address in the 1839 in Pigot's Directory. It may be the same person who married Catherine Topping in 1833 at Creechurch (down Whitechapel Rd). For the record, he was born 1804, Dessau, Dessau-Roßlau, Sachsen-Anhalt, Germany, died in Kent in 1870.

Did he continue to just pay rent after Louisa had passed?

The Sun Fire Records show many names for other numbers at Gloucester Terrace, so it wasn't simply the block number.



(Lang) Augustus Bertold is on the electoral register for Gloucester Terrace in 1833, but has moved to **Berner St** by 1835. He was possibly also known as Gottlob Frederick August Bertold, who was born 1807, Fribourg, Switzerland, married Mary Ann Harvey in 1843, and died in 1865 at Mile End, Old Town London. Interestingly Louisa Shephard was living in **Berner St** in 1829.

Ninthly and lastly, as for 1 or 2 Cannon St Rd, it's also been given the added 'identifier' of New Road for some other people –
